Jesus came to his cousin John to be baptized. John was preparing the way for the greater one who would come afternoon. He was baptizing those who wanted to be changed for the better, who were seeking God's forgiveness.

Jesus came to John to be cleansed by baptismal waters. However Jesus' baptism was different. As Jesus was coming out of the water, the heavens split open and the Spirit came down upon him. A voice from heaven said: "you are my Son, whom I dearly love, in you I am well pleased.
